

7) Lapakahi State Historical Park - 67.5 miles
"Lapakahi preserves the remains of a traditional Hawaiian fishing village, offering a rare glimpse into the daily lives of the island's early inhabitants." Hawaii State Parks

6) Pu'u Kohola Heiau National Historic Site - 55.4 miles
"For Hawaiians today, Pu'ukohola Heiau National Historic Site continues to be a symbol of unification and lasting peace." National Park Service

5) Waikoloa Petroglyph Reserve - 45.3 miles
"The Waikoloa Petroglyph Preserve is one of the best and easiest places on the Big Island to view ki'i pōhaku (petroglyphs)." Big Island Hikes
"Many petroglyphs date to the 16th century. . ." Lonely Planet

4) Kaloko-Honokohau National Historic Park - 23.8 miles
"a special place where Hawaiians could and would recapture, restore and relive the finest hours of their ancestors... a place that was primarily projected to be THE place for the rejuvenation of our rapidlydiminishing traditional cultural beliefs and practices... (Cachola 2014).

3) Hulihe'e Palace - 20.2 miles
"Where royals came to unwind. The Palace was originally built out of lava rock during the Kingdom of Hawai'i on land known as Kalāke'e, a former residence of Kamehameha the Great." Daughters of Hawai'i

2) Kuamo'o Battlefiled - 13 miles
"With her dying breath, Chiefess Manono is said to have uttered "Mālama kō aloha"- "keep your love"- a plea to both sides that no matter what obstacles come to Hawai'i, keep your love of one another." Aloha Kuamo'o 'Aina

1) Pu'uhonua 'O Honaunau - 0 miles - Start
"This spiritual sanctuary, commemorated today as Pu'uhonua o Hōnaunau National Historical Park, was protected by Lono, the God of life." National Park Service

8) Statue of King Kamehameha - 77.2 miles - Finish
". . . the original King Kamehameha I Statue, erected not far from where Hawai'i's greatest king was born.
A great warrior, diplomat and leader, King Kamehameha I united the Hawaiian Islands into one royal kingdom in 1810 after years of conflict." Go Hawaii
